Intended use

Recommended as an all purpose growth medium and as a base of carbohydrate fermentation media.

Directions

Label the ready to use LQ089 bottle. Inoculate the sample and Incubate at specified temperature and time.

Principle And Interpretation

Peptone Water is particularly suitable as a substrate in the study of indole production. Peptone used in Peptone Water is rich in tryptophan content. Presence of indole can be demonstrated using either Kovacs or Ehrlich reagent. Peptone Water is also utilized as a base for carbohydrate fermentation studies with the addition of sugar and indicators such as bromocresol purple, phenol red or bromothymol blue. Peptone Water is useful for cultivation of non-fastidious organisms (1). Peptone water is formulated as per Shread Donovan and Lee (2). Peptone provides essential nutrients. Sodium chloride maintains the osmotic balance of the medium.

Type of specimen

Clinical samples: faecal dilution; Food samples; Water samples

Specimen Collection and Handling

For food samples, follow appropriate techniques for sample collection and processing as per guidelines (3).

For water samples, follow appropriate techniques for sample collection, processing as per guidelines and local standards (4).

For clinical samples follow appropriate techniques for handling specimens as per established guidelines (5,6).

After use, contaminated materials must be sterilized by autoclaving before discarding.

Warning and Precautions

In Vitro diagnostic Use. For professional use only. Read the label before opening the container. Wear protective gloves/ protective clothing/eye protection/face protection. Follow good microbiological lab practices while handling specimens and culture. Standard precautions as per established guidelines should be followed while handling clinical specimens. Limitations

1. Further recovery from this enriched medium onto selective media is required.
2. Biochemical and serological characterization is required to be carried out from pure isolates for complete identification.

Performance of the medium is expected when used as per the direction on the label within the expiry period when stored at recommended temperature.

Storage and Shelf Life

Store between 15-30°C. Use before expiry date on the label. Product performance is best if used within stated expiry period.

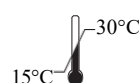

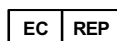
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**In vitro diagnostic
